SENPAI CORNER

Hello everyone; January/February is a great time to study your trees; plan out what branches are weak or are not relevant to the overall design and determine what will need to be eliminated or re-positioned. Since your trees are still in a somewhat dormant state we are still a little early to begin fertilizing, however, it is a good time to stock up on your supplies or mix up and create fertilizer cake if that is the route you want to go. Store all dry ingredients in a sealed container so they do not get wet and begin to ferment. Do not ignore your normal bonsai care, as this is a time when insects and fungus will start to thrive on your trees. (Especially with this warm weather we are having) continue to monitor your moisture levels and watch for sneaky overnight frosts.

TIDBITS

Birch Family – A group of trees and shrubs comprising over 40 species, the members of this family carry male and female catkins on the same tree, the females being small, initially erect when flowering, and held above the males. In Betula and Corylus, the males develop in autumn and are carried over winter, opening to release their pollen before, or when, the leaves appear in spring. Those of Carpinus, although preformed, are hidden in the winter buds.

Beech Family – The members of this large, mainly temperate family have simple and alternate leaves and fruit in the form of nuts. These are either fully enclosed by an involucre (or cupule) of fused bracts as in Fagus, Nothofagus and Castanea, or merely supported by it as in Quercus. Male and female flowers are carried in separate catkins on the same tree.
