SEPTEMBER MEETING BY CHARLES

Our September meeting was put together by Bea. We went to Olivina and learned about olive oil and its production, plus a little history around the property and early days of Livermore. Near the end, there was olive oil tasting and several of us went home with bottles.

A dozen of us attended the meeting.





Our Host was most interested in seeing our Bonsai, so three of us brought in our trees.



Here we are looking at the machine that extracts the oil. There are 10,000 olive trees on the property. Harvest is approaching so this machine will be working for several weeks to get thru all the olives on the property. They also extract oil from olives brought in by other growers.

If you have an olive tree or two at home which produce olives, once a year, the Crohare open their press to the public. You can bring your olives and at the end of the day, you can come and get your oil.

OCTOBER MEETING BY CHARLES

For October, I was thinking, weather and AQI permitting, of having the meeting at my house in the back yard with social distancing as much as possible. SENPAI CORNER BY CHARLES

With all of the recent fires, and all the “bad air” I would encourage frequent spraying of your tree’s foliage to rinse off the accumulated ash. As we near the end of the year, you should consider shifting your fertilizing to high Nitrogen, and complete any final wiring and pruning before winter. There are some arguments that this is also a good time to re-pot a tree, since there is a short growth spurt prior to winter, this will provide enough warm weather for the roots to re-establish before it quiets down over winter. This way, come springtime the tree will spend its energy on growing foliage instead of establishing new roots. Stay safe and stay sane.
